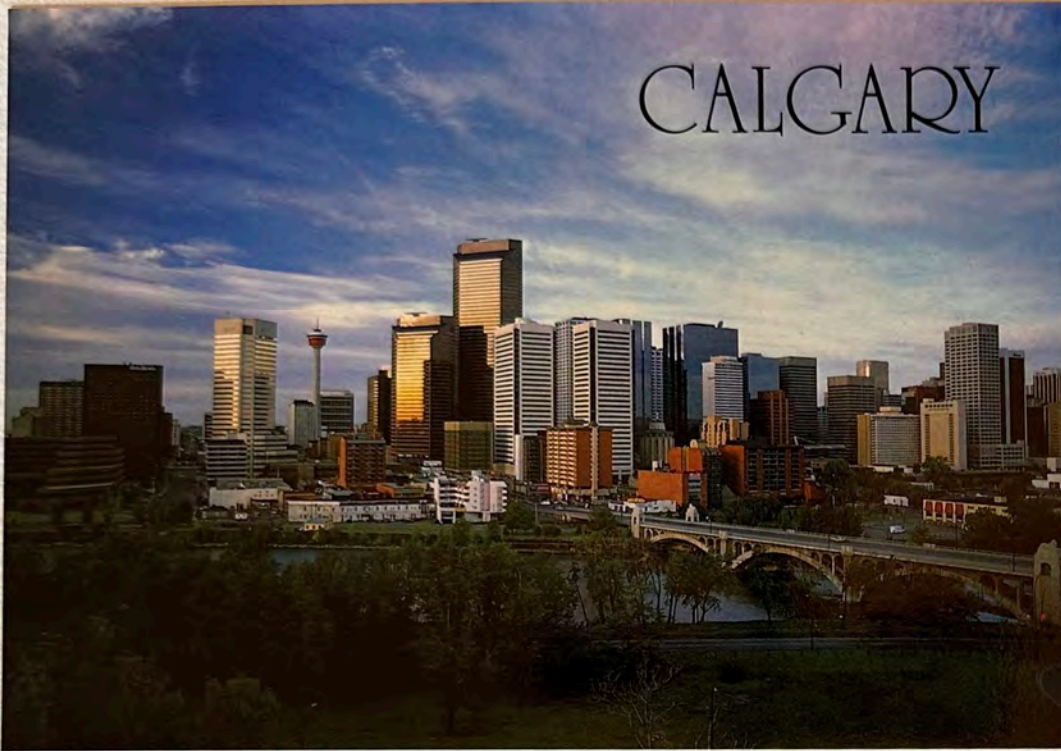


Driving R side of road. Wide open spaces. Booked in at Quality Inn. Simple menu proper. 498 for 2! Drove into town parked by Calgary Tower. Went up tower. Magnificent view over & circumscribed centre, spread out to biggest area of any Canadian town. (prairie was cheap.) Nice friendly woman who had lived in V.I., Scotland pointed out the sights. She lived in a rural village and was upset by Red Indian attitudes, lack of responsible behaviour, especially as the whites' private money went into it. Five skyscrapers, not offensive. Down to deserted shopping precinct. Walked through Elbow Museum (closed) Aurora Borealis 1 & 2 pictures. 1 - R.C.M.P. leader Mitchell crossing Bow River to found the fort. 2) 3,400 cattle on a drive from Montana to a ranch 20 miles to W. of Calgary. (Cattle town later superseded by oil find repeated in 1970s near Edmonton) Home Petrochemical building. Olympic precinct & old town hall with three Bronzes and some wrought iron gates from an English mansion (incongruously in a way) Highlighted by reflected sunset in glass windows of new town hall. Civic centre had theatre, concert hall for C.P.O., other cultural things (but rather infrequent). Walked down pedestrian mall for about 1 mile. - several druggies or winies - large empty shops. - ghost town. Devonian gardens with other of new glass skyscraper. - very imaginative with lots of waterfalls, fountains, statues etc. wedding in one area. - back tho' arcades. to car. Bath. changed. Dinner in hotel. Ill dress enlote. Tim Pacific salmon steak in different house wine. boring getting speeches at table nearby - bed.

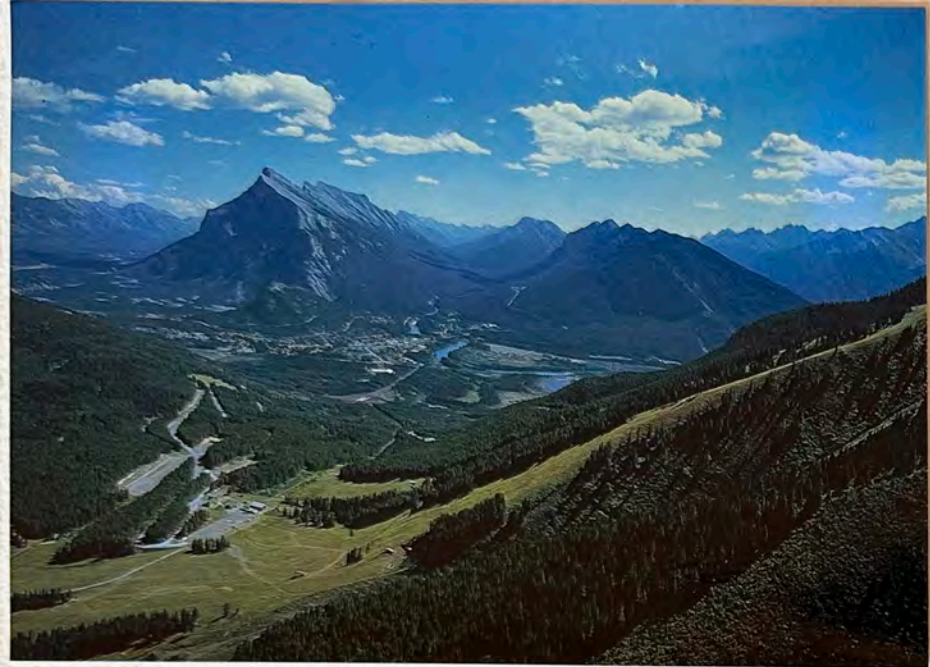

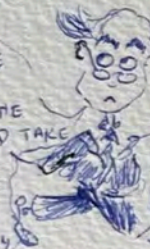

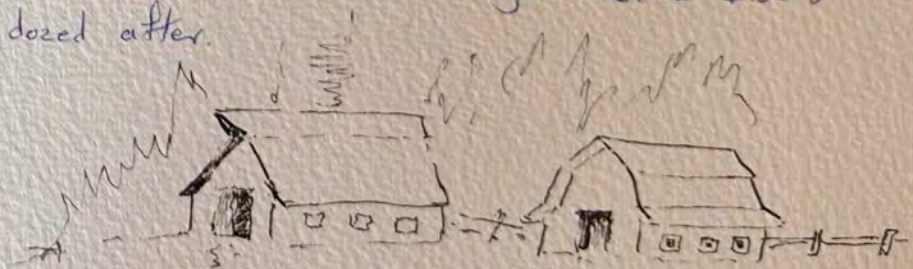
Hot Sunny. John Dash away breakfast 2 poached eggs, fried wild potatoes. On the road by 9.30. Drove to see view over Calgary and the Bow river then Highway 1 to Banff. Crossed C.P.R. railway - old station now only freight trains and one tourist passenger train - occasionally. Tented by info. - got info. Walked up main st. window shopping to old museum - a museum of a museum full of stuffed birds & animals. Walked back - bought 2 sweet shirts in Hudson Bay Trading Co. for John & Michael. In Pica bar & had delicious <sup>hot</sup> seafood salad with Caesare dressing, & beer. In car to telepherique (cable car) up to top of Sulphur Mountain with herds of Japanese. 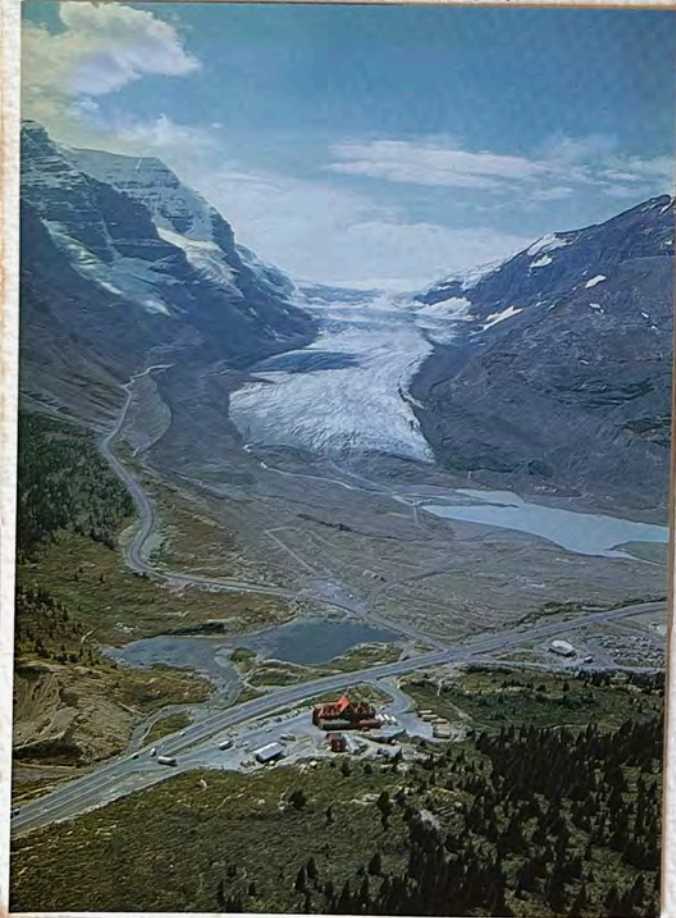


Columbia Ice Field, Athabasca Glacier

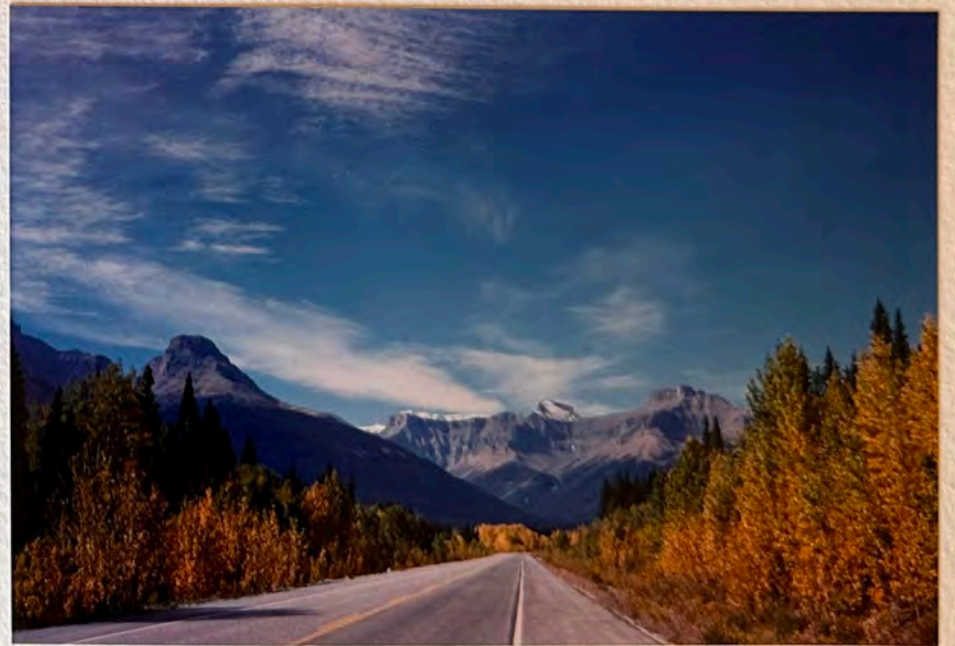

Monday  
24.9.90 Another hot and sunny day. Up at size. Frost on car.  
Air breath taking. Breakfast superb but expensive. Orange juice, muesli,  
sausage, eggs, bacon, flapjacks. £5 each. help yourself. Drove to Mall stopped  
for picnic then up to lake house. parked walked past elksau to Lake -  
residual Oregon pappas. Intreated with Japanese + r. walked along lake  
Back to hotel & found cheapest rate was as little as the Post. 1 slice  
Doncaster boy working there on a world trip. had been to Ciggleswick!  
Back to mall to get petrol - cheap - 1/2 U.K. price. On to Jasper  
highway. Crowfoot Glacier - one toe missing. Bow Lake. Stopped at  
Nuti-Ti-Jah rest house to enquire tariff. £=30 a double room.  
Peyto Lake - spectacular view of turquoise lake - suspended.  
(silt in water) walk in natural rock garden - cold by red squirrels.  
Mistaya Canyon - walked to swallow hole in Mistaya river -  
then up a trail. Saw more red squirrels. Coney Tapa. Back  
to car. Woods full of seeds with flowers like *agrostis* &  
*chellebunnies*, anemones. Crossed the Upper Saskatchewan River  
Joined Highway 11 from Edmonton. - Sami booked at 1 Hotel.  
& drove on to lunch stop see over. On by. Curious Mountain  
& weeping wall. Then up a pass (The Big Bend.) - past the  
Panters Ridge trail to Athabasca Glacier 120 sq. miles of  
iceheld in 10 yrs already 2/3 has melted & glaciers retreated 1  
mile from the road. Booked seat on Snowcoach - usual Japanese  
& English couple in R.V. from Queen Brewster shuttle up to snowcoach  
driven by French girl with forced humor. 'If I take my foot off  
the accelerator the coach stops which is just as well as I have no brakes'  
25 mins slow drag up to icefield. Drank the water. & return.  
Back in car drove 1/2 hr up to Jasper. Fairly featureless except  
for Continuous Chain mountain. turned round back to motel  
at Upper Saskatchewan crossing. Book into cozy log cabin but  
'Restaurant' was a shock. Unlike usual Joe's Kaff. Had to settle  
for barbecued chicken (good soup) served in awkward way by yet another  
silly youth. The real beer was unspeakable so had a free orange squash  
(only cost 15¢. = £7.5 for 2.















Tuesday 25th Sept Up a 7. Good breakfast £3 each. 2 egg <sup>ham</sup> bacon chips (hush brown) Strolled back to lake house balcony or two photo stops  
 another walk at Lake Palo. Scolding squirrel again. No birds - could walk for miles. At Lake house mall bought likkas, provisions + had another  
 breakfast! Coffee + cherry crumble in suitor's kaff - full of weirdos. Brandy v. expensive. 7/15 so settled for Canadian Club Whisky £7 + Wine from  
 Okanagan Valley. £2-50. - turned out good. Back to Highway 1, gradual ascent over Kicking Horse Pass which was a non event by European  
 standards - passed by summit without noticing, + stopped at Spiral Tunnels of C.P.R. just as train arrived! Very dramatic view of train  
 Dropped down to valley, took road up Yoho valley to Takakkaw Falls. One steep hairpin bend then lovely drive through woods. Huge  
 jet of water coming from Daly glacier. Picnic by river. Back to T.E. Highway, dropped down to Field. Pretty horse town - once v  
 important on the C.P.R. - Drive round it then out + back to Highway 1. Dropped down to Golden - important staging on C.P.R. with huge  
 sidings - looked a dump. - Highway 1 bypassed it. - gradual ascent into awesome country approaching Rogers Pass. - gradual  
 ascent through snow tunnels passing control point en route. C.P.R. in distance. Got to summit without realising it. R.C.M.P. check on  
 all vehicles. Declared Jill as a dangerous weapon or firearm - showed passports + driving licences + waved on. After 1/2 mile realised  
 we should have stopped to look at amenities at summit. Turned round. Had coffee then into exhibition of C.P.R. and how  
 it dealt with avalanches. 2 excellent films. Railroaders 1950 + Snow War - using a howitzer to abate avalanches -  
 have controlled ones. Avalanches depend on shape of snow crystals. Pictures of disasters. 1910 at Rogers Pass + another one  
 when 62 were killed leading to making of tunnel. and now 1988 another one 9 miles built. Descent in bad weather.

Sun had gone in - mountains closed in and River Valley of  
 river. Descent to Revelstoke - the next habitable town.  
 a delightful place - had been major railway town until usurped  
 by Golden. Huge trains chugging back + forth, wocooing at each other.  
 Found excellent Alpine Hotel. 2 blocks back from railway but heard  
 it all night. V helpful young man directed us to superb Regent  
 Restaurant. Walked to it - Cream in white sauce. Caesar Salad.  
 Reached B.C. Salmon. Baked spuds. chopped olives crispy <sup>bicon bit.</sup>  
 Canadian Cicerwartz trammer (more like Mincodet.) Coffee <sup>Soured</sup>  
 2 delightful birds chattering - most interesting - one from <sup>can. can</sup>  
 Toronto - the other home bird.

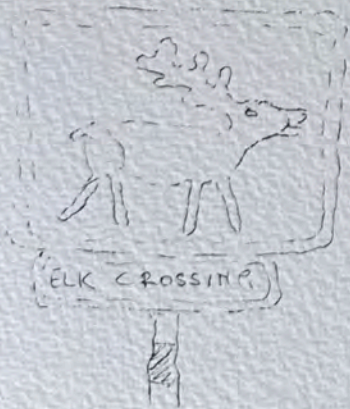




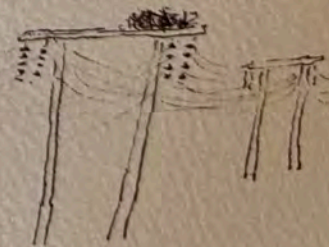




Wednesday 26th Sept. Hot, Sunny - clouded over, then hot, sunny. Breakfast at Alphaus - delightfully decorated interior Jill Cinnamon Toast. John Poached eggs  
 Fried potatoes, bacon. Girl in Swiss dress took photos of Mini St. Redstone, then drove 15 miles to top of Mt. Revelstoke. - Rain Forest then Snow  
 Forest. Opened by Edward Prince of Wales in 1921. Foundation laid by Duke of Cornwall. Trees give way to alpine meadows with funny  
 thin conifers at top. On way up flock of American Robins Woodpecker, Crow, Jays. Nice walk on trail at top, full of flower seed heads,  
 views of snowcapped mountains. Selkirk & Monashee. Saw a large eared large rodent (size of Guinea pig) Woodpecker, Jay, Flowers were.  
 Lupine, anemone, valerian, indian paintbrush. - air thin - like wine wonderful smells pine, another pungent. Back down to Revelstoke. - petrol  
 lakeside drive - no habitation - to Shelter Bay. 20 min wait - talked to Log Truck. Ferry free took 20 min to cross Arrow Lake arrived 1.20  
 long deserted drive on road built since 1966? purpose to Nakusp. Saw long legged long eared fox. Desolate landscape & lake. After  
 miles about 3 houses and a logging boom arrived at Nakusp. Pleasant lakeside village with a little harbour, pretty lakeside villas. Staked  
 up at supermarket (outside for the place) then drove on down to Fauquier. took 5 minute ferry to Headles. Fauquier had 1 motel & a few  
 houses. Drive then was at first with some pasture land and about 1 hamlet - a few scattered small holdings then rolling forest  
 terrain - not mountainous but high, & a very good road - absolutely no dwellings. Road eventually descended to meadows - saw  
 3 white tailed deer and a few houses. - Cherryville - no hotel - but a campsite. Terrain opened out to low rocky hills pastures  
 more houses rather shabby, Coldstream. - Tim made honours - houndnip dead cars, big signs, and then to Vernon. Spreading  
 mess - motels, petrol stations supermarkets - a jumble of ill assorted architecture in various materials of no harmony  
 but in keeping with the sort of music being dished out by unwashed long haired drug ridden alcoholic, one armed bandit, unmond tasteless  
 society which has afflicted us since the 1960s - Beatles David Frost Rolling Stones. Womens Lib. & Pill. Selected ~~East~~ Globe Motel as it

 in Golden. Town is booming with tourism !!! She didnt want to become U.S.A citizen. Indians a big problem & Hongkong  
 Chinese taking over Vancouver & B.C. Tital was superb. Jill. Bell. Soup. John Bill dressing salad then Fiset Tilguon with  
 Seafood dressing. Jill Rice John Baked spud with 2 yoghurt tattings, water melon, mixed veg, mostly cauliflower. Red House wine  
~~at B.C.~~ - nothing named on wine list from Okanagan - This tasted like a Cramay grape and was also offered a sweet  
 red - which tasted like port. Staggered back to bed. Tital cost £7 a head. (excluding wine). Asleep by 10. Vernon rose at  
 6 am in the dark and a train whooped thru' at 7 am.

In fact, in the middle of the incubation period, the embryos develop eyes. They hatch on average and live on the nutrients of their yolk sacs until they weigh five to six times their development, a time when embryos will die if they are kept together.

The success of this stage can be low as results, a few days before of other species go directly to live or remain in diapause for years in the water.

In the gravel of the spawning beds, the adults lay and before they begin to live that are before death. Survival for protection against predators and various fungi, gravelly area life.

Thursday 27th Sept. Vernon woke at 6am 7.30. Coffee from the Sikh lady  
 Breakfast at Royal Knight Jill Danish Bun. John Sausage Egg. (Senior Critic)  
 Rang up Jack to arrange meeting. Walked to Supermarket. back. Vernon has  
 little to offer. Drove out down side of lake. Rolling prairie  
 hills down to lakeside orchards on each side to K in industrial  
 dump. Timber, fruit - fruit stalls everywhere. Heavy traffic - bridge across  
 Lake Okanagan and immediately on to quiet winding picturesque lakeside  
 concave drive - deserted. (But not for long because of developments - not  
 yet commenced. - As blue as Como, stretching to U.S.A. border. (100 miles)

 Many amenities golf, boating etc. & fairly uncluttered town.  
 Nice drive with views of lake. Road followed C.P.R. Busy Highway 1  
 Got to Kamloops at 4.50 pm. Commuter traffic horrendous &

 but horror - took wrong turning and crossed the river! had to  
 retrace steps - regain Trans Canada Highway and shortly  
 turned off. to Cache Creek to avoid main highway

 salmon leap. (The Sockeye Day is 2nd October!) Progress

Awesome gorge C.R.R. along river. Then Hells Gate formed by landslide when making the C.N.R. <sup>(1914)</sup> Dropped down 500 ft. by cable car to complex shops, restaurant & demonstration. Film on sockeye salmon and 5 levels of fish ladders. Red sockeye clearly visible entering & leaving the ladder in use. - go up to Sheswep Lake, Atams River 4 years after leaving it as 2 year fingerlings to return to spawn & die. 5 varieties Pacific Salmon. Sockeye. Pink. Coho. Spring & Chum. Coffee. Chap in Scots dress playing bagpipes & unique Scottish songs. to guitar. Back up to top. drive thro widening gorge. v. little vegetation turned off before Hope to route 7. Valley widened. Picnic hutch in picnic spot. saw chickadees. John painted flowers.



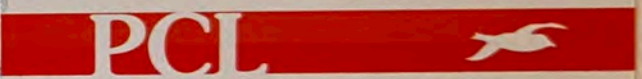

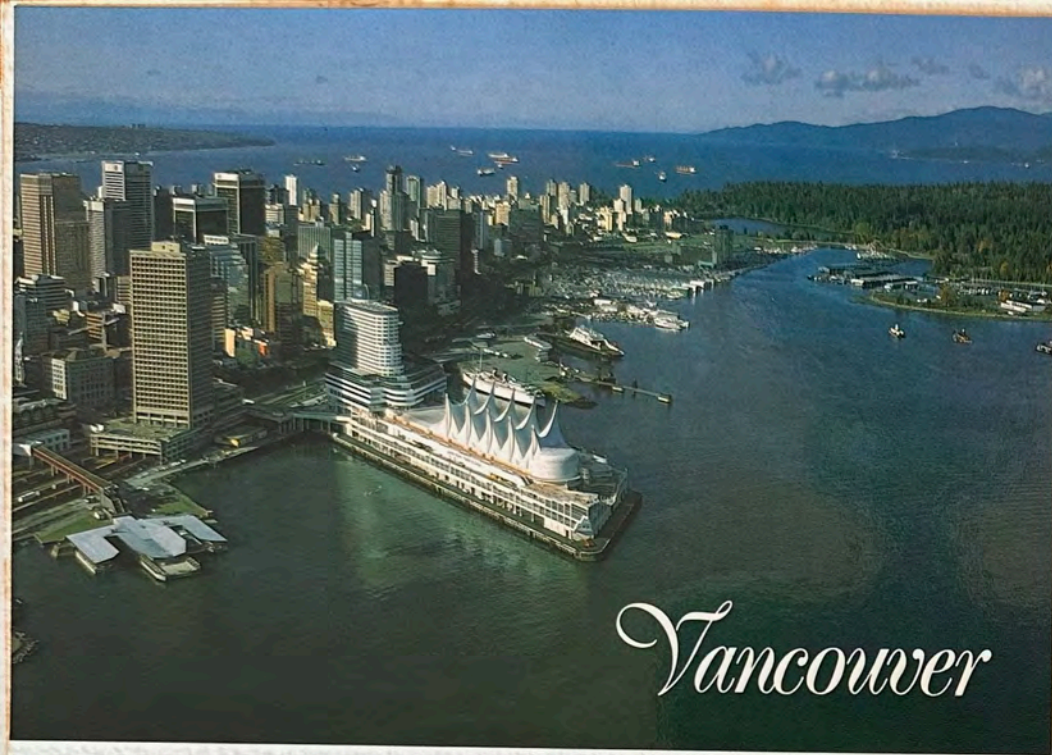


Hideous drive from Mission onwards - got petrol - hoardings, petrol stations more

Tuesday, 2nd. October. Cloudy - F. cold. Family up, at 7. (so were we.) Norwegian nanny arrived at 8am. Continental Breakfast. Ralph, Leslie left for work & Ben to school. Rang, Ralph's travel agent who arranged hire car. (Budget.) Called taxi, transported to Airport Budget hire. £15. - . Hugre kinder's luncheon appeared. - couldn't find out how to move the seats - were eventually demonstrated - all worked electrically! up down side to side. !!  
With trepidation drove off. Interstate 5. - v. busy - traffic passing on all sides. Not much of note.



Free coffee before. provided for a week by volunteers from some choir, band (school.) Made about £350 a week. with donations. 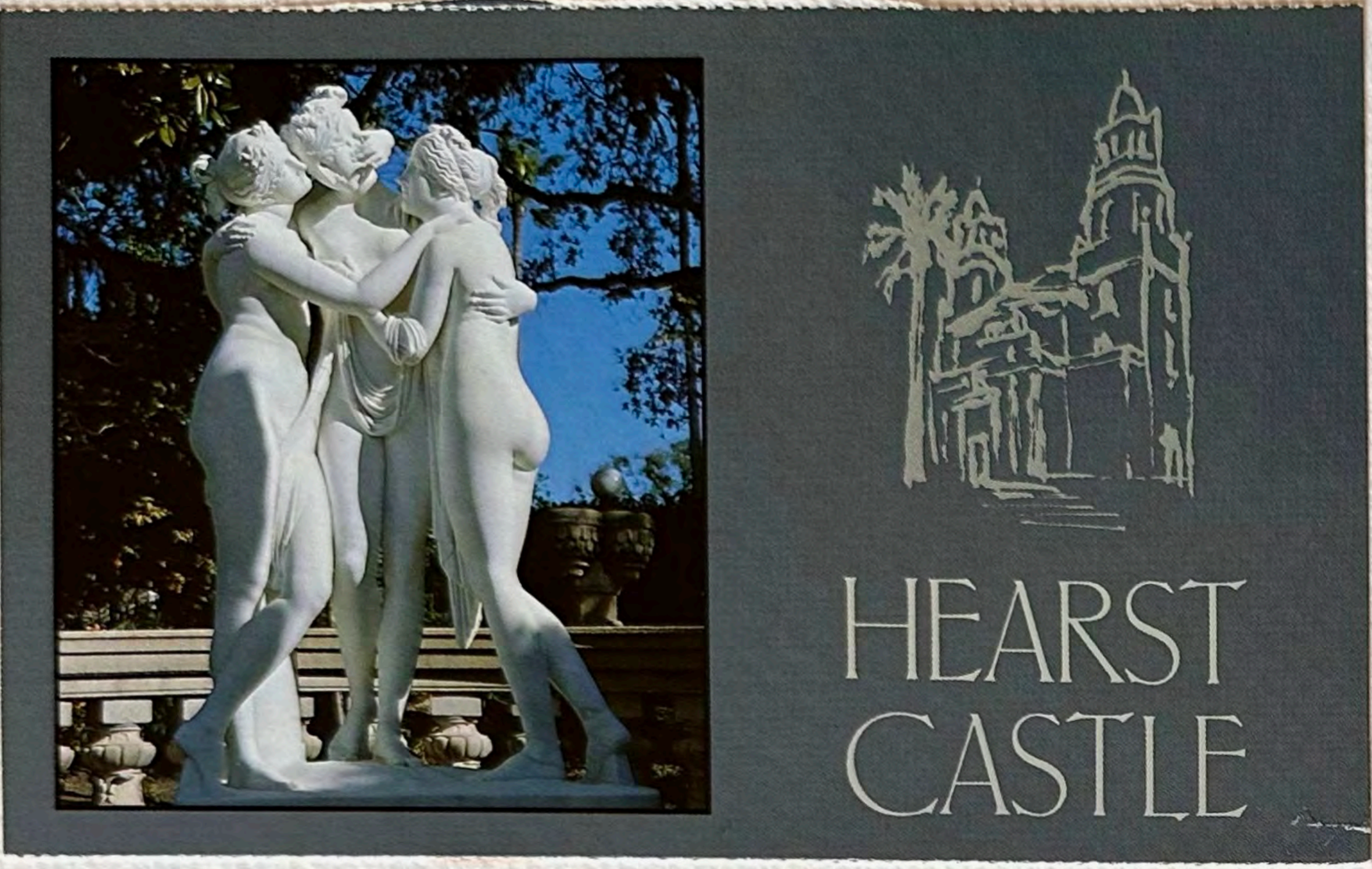
Between Big Sur, St. Simeon

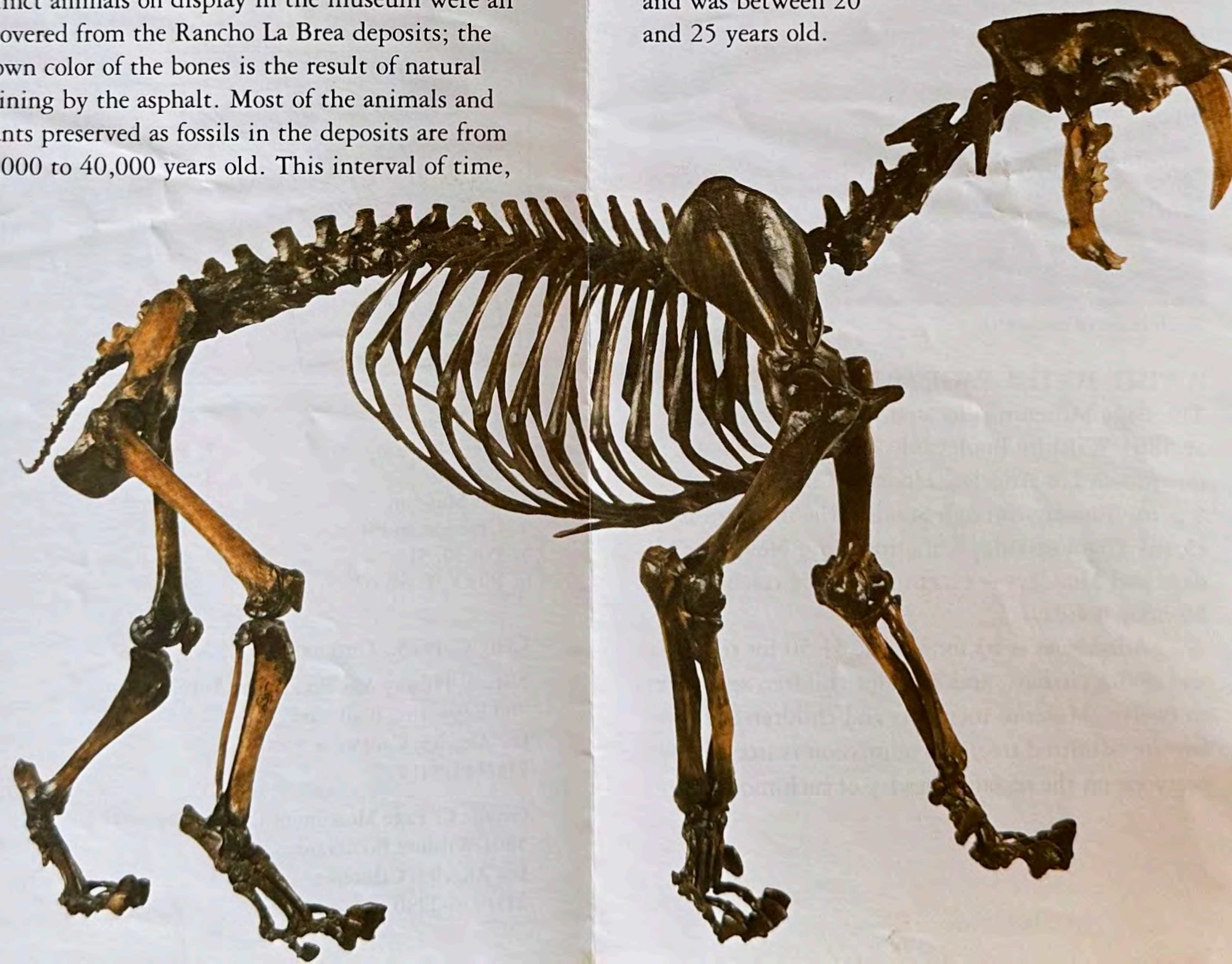
## BUILT WITH CHILDREN IN MIND

The Page Museum is a research and an educational facility, and the fossil storage areas and paleontology laboratory are both in full public view, so that visitors can observe the cleaning, preparation, cataloging, and study of Rancho La Brea fossils. Many of the exhibits are designed with children in mind; they are invited to view an animated model of a juvenile mammoth, to pit their strength against the pull of asphalt, and to touch the massive, asphalt-soaked bone of a giant ground sloth.

The skeletons of ground sloths and other extinct animals on display in the museum were all recovered from the Rancho La Brea deposits; the brown color of the bones is the result of natural staining by the asphalt. Most of the animals and plants preserved as fossils in the deposits are from 10,000 to 40,000 years old. This interval of time,

the latest part of the Pleistocene epoch, represents a very recent stage in the history of the earth, about 65 million years after the Age of Dinosaurs.

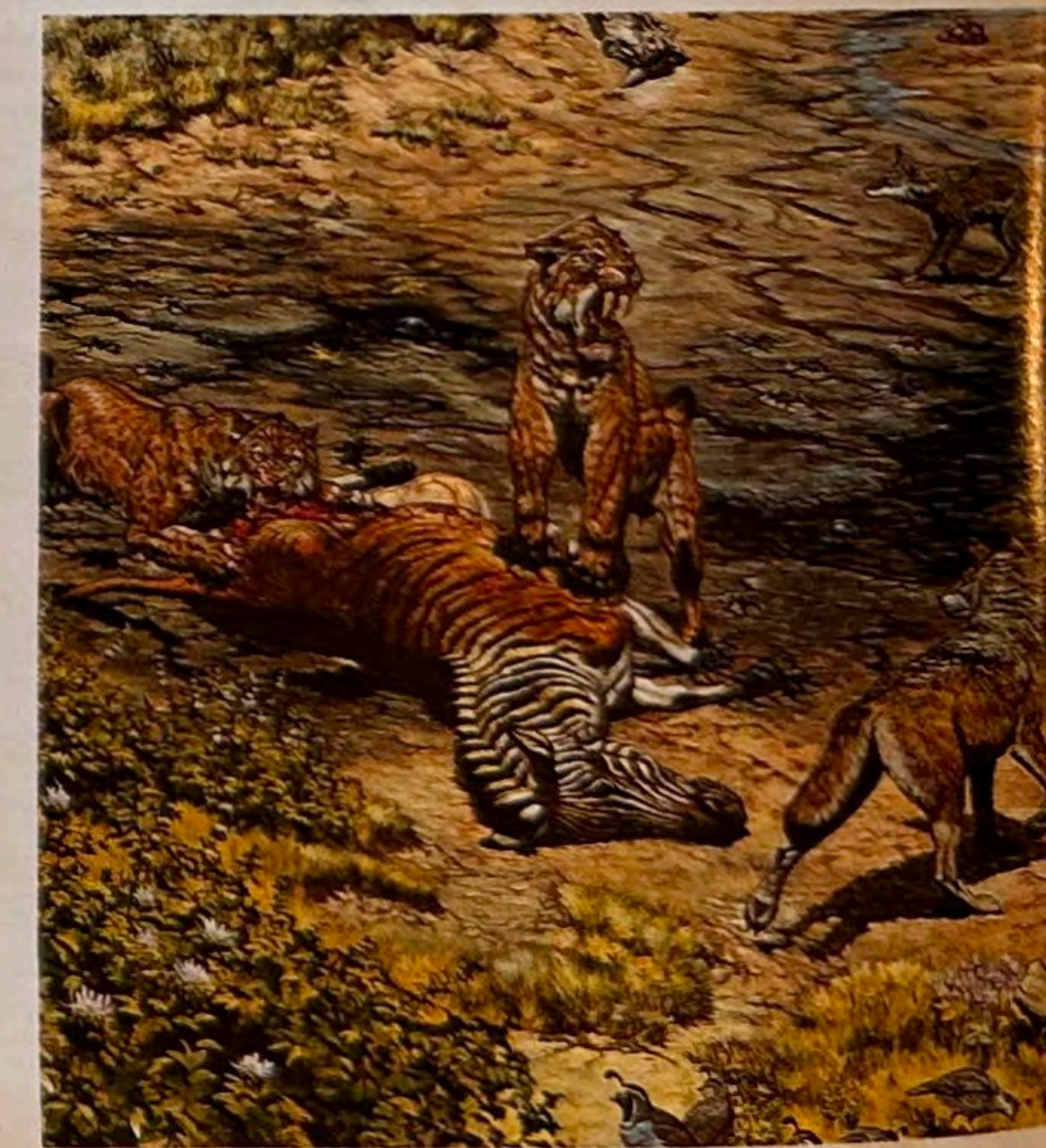
Fossils from Rancho La Brea range in size from microscopic to mammoth and include single-celled plants, pollen, seeds, leaves and wood, clam and snail shells, insects and spiders, fish, frogs and toads, snakes and turtles, birds, and mammals. The remains of only one human, La Brea Woman, have been found in the deposits. Studies show that the bones, a skull and partial skeleton, belonged to a woman who lived about 9,000 years ago, stood about 4 feet 10 inches tall, and was between 20 and 25 years old.



## TRAPPED IN TIME

The Rancho La Brea fossils appear to have been preserved by a unique combination of rapid sedimentation and asphalt impregnation. Asphalt seeped to the surface primarily during warm summer weather. The resulting shallow puddles were often concealed by a surface coating of wind-blown leaves and dust.

Occasionally, an unwary animal became trapped by the asphalt. Its struggles and ultimate death in turn lured carnivores and scavengers, as big cats and condors, to their fate. The bodies soon decayed, and individual bones rotted free, became saturated with asphalt, and settled at least part way into the mire. During the winter, cool temperatures solidified the asphalt, and rainwater-choked streams deposited a layer of sediment over the exposed bones. The warm weather of early summer then dried the stream and liquefied the asphalt, resetting the trap.

### A CONTINUING PROCESS OF DISCOVERY

For two months each summer, visitors can view excavation of Rancho La Brea material from Pit 91, one of the richest fossil deposits in the world. Early excavators focused their attention on the bones of the largest, most spectacular mammals and birds and large pieces of fossil wood. But in 1969 the staff of the Natural History Museum began a new excavation of Pit 91, seeking to recover a greater diversity of specimens. Many of the smaller sorts of La Brea fossils—seeds and pollen, insects and mollusks, fish, amphibians, and small birds and rodents—are best known from this excavation. Because plants and small animals are more geographically restricted to particular habitats than larger mammals and birds, their remains provide the most reliable evidence of past environmental conditions.

“Chock full of bones” is how one Pit 91 paleontologist described the tar pits. Statistics prove his point: scientists have recovered almost 1.5 million vertebrate and 2.5 million invertebrate fossils from the deposits. In all some 140 species of plants and more than 420 species of animals are now known from Rancho La Brea.

### A WINDOW INTO THE PAST

The importance of the fossils recovered from Rancho La Brea, and of the deposits that remain in and around Hancock Park, cannot be overestimated. They hold the answers to many questions about the surroundings in which the first human immigrants to North America found themselves.

A visit to the Page Museum of La Brea Discoveries gives a picture of the diversity of Ice Age life in southern California. The Rancho La Brea fossils that are exhibited and stored in the museum are a unique natural resource, a window into the life of the past.

### A VISIT TO THE PAGE MUSEUM

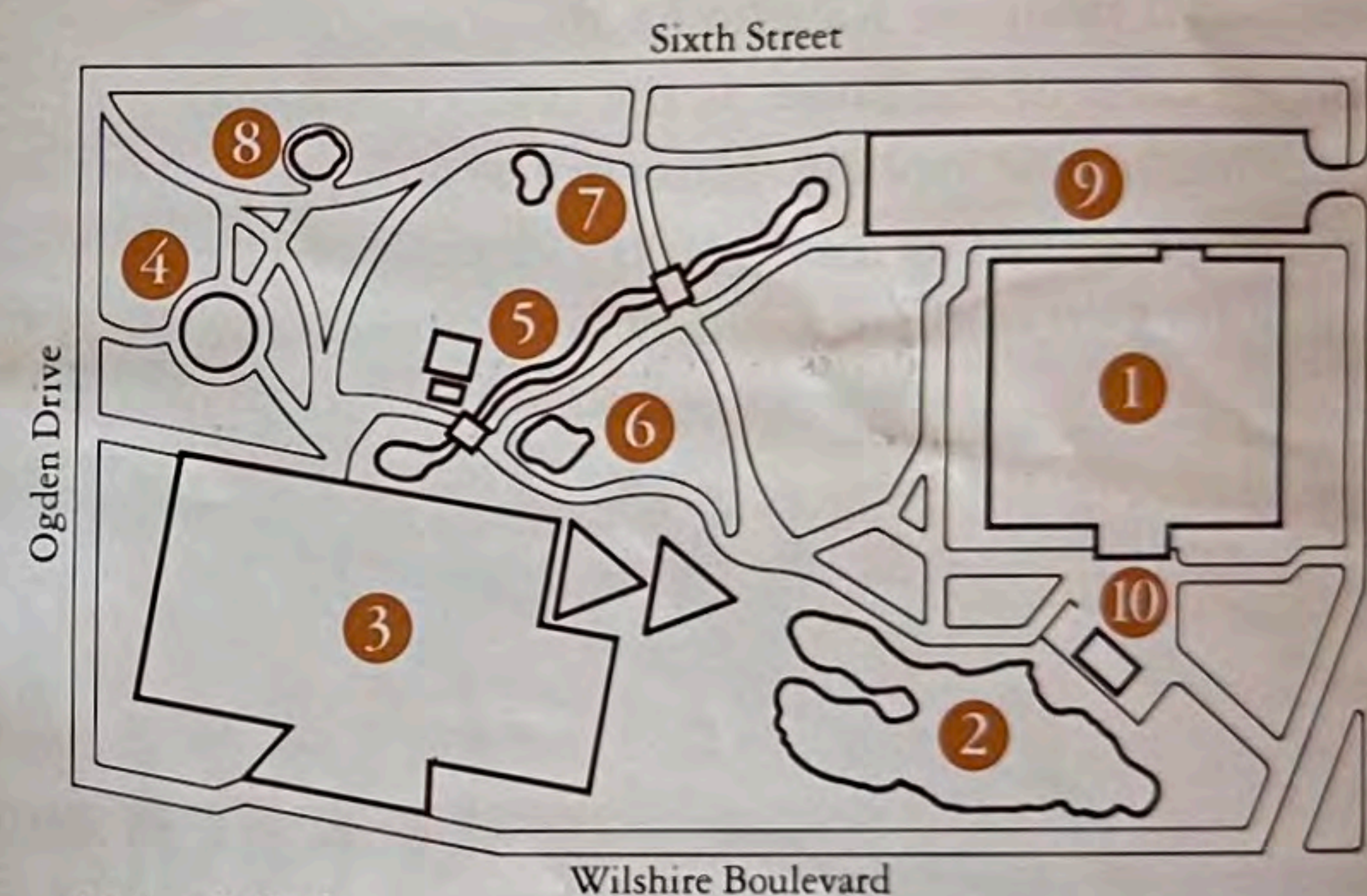

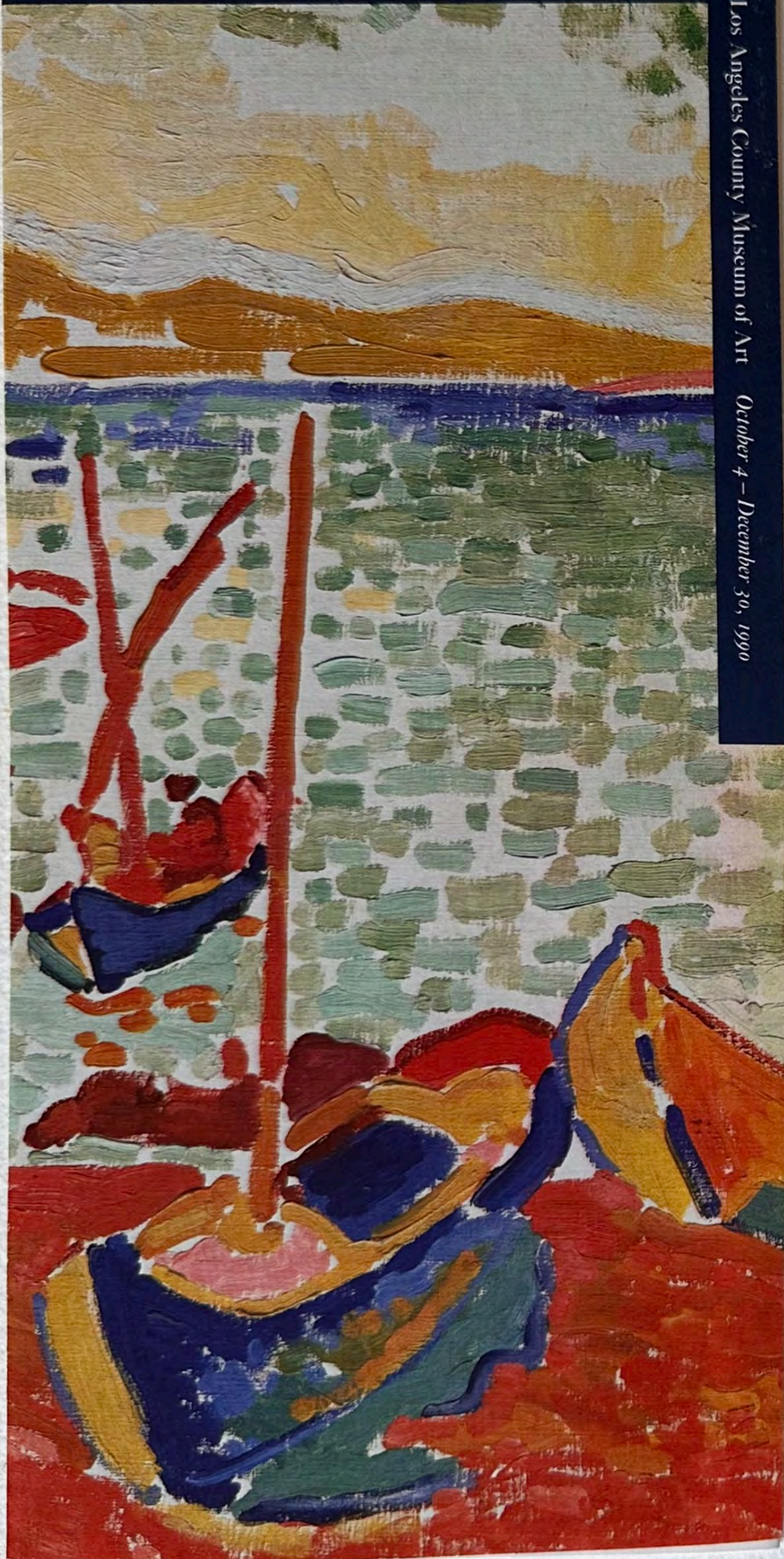

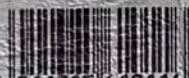

Cabullo rose from the rocks as captain of crossbowmen - 2 ships (one the Discovery) caravelle were built in Guatemala, sailed up almost to the mouth of the Oregon river before being driven back by gales. - attempting to discover the NW Passage (like Cook) took up history of Spaniards on W. Coast of America - Later kicked out by Mexicans.

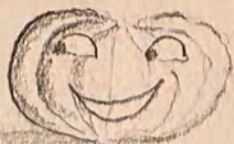
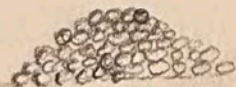

**The Museum.** The J. Paul Getty Museum was created for the benefit of the public through the generosity of its founder, who was born in 1892 in Minneapolis, Minnesota, and spent part of his youth in Los Angeles. Mr. Getty lived most of his adult life in Europe, where he began collecting art in the 1930s. His interests centered on Greek and Roman antiquities, Renaissance and Baroque paintings, and European decorative arts. Although much expanded, the Museum's collections still reflect the spirit and enthusiasms of Mr. Getty.

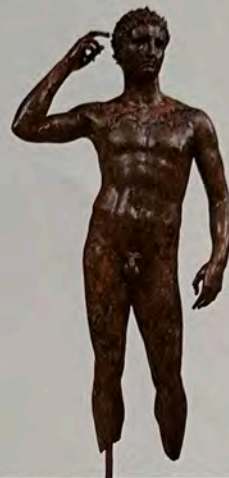
In 1953 the Museum was established in a large house in Malibu that Mr. Getty had acquired for retirement purposes. By the mid-1960s the house could no longer accommodate the rapidly growing collections, so Mr. Getty decided to commission a new building. Construction began in 1971, and the present Museum was opened to the public in January 1974.

**The Building.** The Museum is a recreation of an ancient Roman country house. Its plan is based on that of the Villa dei Papiri, which stood outside the city of Herculaneum overlooking the Bay of Naples. The villa was completely buried, as were Pompeii and Herculaneum, by the eruption of Mount Vesuvius in A.D. 79. In the eighteenth century the villa was accidentally rediscovered and was explored by archaeologists and by treasure seekers using a system of underground tunnels. Most of these tunnels were later sealed, once more leaving the villa sixty feet below the earth. A floor plan and notes made during the eighteenth-century explorations were the basis for the Museum's plan.

**The Gardens.** The Museum's gardens include trees, flowers, shrubs, and herbs like those that might have been found growing two thousand years ago at the Villa dei Papiri. The bronze statues in the gardens are modern casts of statues unearthed during the eighteenth-century explorations of the villa; the originals are in the archaeological museum in Naples. Illusionistic wall paintings in the gardens and elsewhere in the Museum are patterned after frescoes found in Pompeii and Herculaneum.

## THE COLLECTIONS

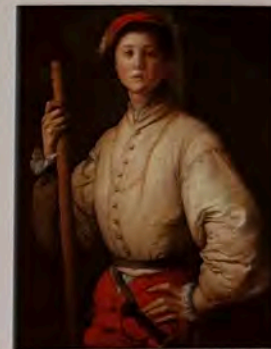

**Antiquities (main level)**  
The collection of Greek and Roman antiquities spans the period from 2500 B.C. to A.D. 300 and includes marble and bronze sculptures, wall paintings, mosaics, vases, and objects in precious metals and other media. Areas of particular strength are Greek vases and sculpture, Roman portraits, and the arts of Magna Graecia. Among the major works are the Cycladic Harpist, 2600–2500 B.C.; the limestone and marble Aphrodite from the end of the fifth century B.C.; and the bronze Victorious Athlete from the late fourth or early third century B.C.

**Drawings (upper level)**  
The drawings collection was begun in 1981 with the purchase of Rembrandt's red chalk study of a nude woman as Cleopatra. The Museum has since acquired more than three hundred drawings ranging in date from the fifteenth to the nineteenth century. This group includes works by Leonardo, Raphael, van Dyck, Dürer, Bernini, Rubens, Watteau, Ingres, Goya, Cézanne, and van Gogh. Although primary emphasis has been placed on the acquisition of drawings by major artists, the Museum has also purchased works by lesser-known masters such as Savery, Bloemaert, Dolci, and Gros.

**Paintings (upper level)**  
European paintings from the early fourteenth to the late nineteenth century are included in the collection. The French, Dutch, and Italian schools are particularly well represented and in recent years the Museum's nineteenth-century holdings have been greatly expanded. Highlights now include important works by Masaccio, Bouts, Mantegna, Pontorno, Rembrandt, Terbrugghen, Gainsborough, David, Millet, Renoir, Ensor, van Gogh, and Munch.

*Please note: Paintings are also exhibited in a number of galleries together with sculpture and decorative arts.*

### Manuscripts (upper level)

The collection was begun in 1983 with the purchase of a distinguished group of 144 manuscripts, and additional books and single leaves have been acquired since then. European and Byzantine manuscript illumination, chiefly from the ninth through the seventeenth century, is represented. In addition to masterpieces of Ottonian, Romanesque, and Gothic illumination, the collection contains manuscripts illuminated by Jean Fouquet, Taddeo Crivelli, Giovanni di Paolo, Simon Bening, the Boucicaut Master, Simon Marmion, and Georg Hoefnagel.

### Decorative Arts (upper level)

This collection includes furniture, carpets, tapestries, clocks, silver, porcelain, and other small objects made for the French royal household, the nobility, and the wealthy bourgeoisie. These pieces date from the early years of Louis XIV's reign through the end of the Napoleonic era, spanning the years 1660 to 1815. Three paneled rooms displaying objects made in the Régence, Rococo, and Neoclassical periods are included in the upper-level galleries in which this collection is exhibited. German furniture and ceramics are also on display.

### Photographs (upper level)

This collection was begun in 1984 with the purchase of several distinguished private collections. Its strength lies in European and American photographs dating from the early 1840s to the 1950s. Included are works by early practitioners such as Talbot, Cameron, and Nadar, as well as by later artists such as Cunningham, Evans, Kertész, Man Ray, Sander, Strand, Ulmann, and Weston.

*Please note: Because drawings, manuscripts, and photographs may be damaged by prolonged exposure to light, exhibitions from these collections change on a regular basis.*

### Sculpture and Works of Art (upper level)

This collection features European sculpture from the Middle Ages to the end of the nineteenth century, as well as European decorative arts from the medieval, Renaissance, and Baroque periods. Selected works by important sculptors, including Antico, Giambologna, Bernini, de Vries, Houdon, Clodion, Barye, and Carpeaux, are shown on a rotating basis in the galleries that exhibit paintings. Ceramics, glass, and bronzes are shown in upper-level galleries.

**Garden Tea Room (main level).** The Garden Tea Room offers cafeteria-style lunches and snacks. Luncheon is served from 11:00 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. and light refreshments from 9:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

**Bookstore (main level).** The Museum Bookstore offers a variety of scholarly and general-interest art publications. The illustrated *Handbook* highlights key objects in the Museum's collections; its companion *Guide* provides information on the building and grounds. Books, postcards, posters, and slides of selected works from the collections may be purchased in the Bookstore or by mail order. A list of Museum publications is available on request. Bookstore hours are from 10:00 a.m. to 4:45 p.m.

**Photography.** You may take photographs of the buildings, grounds, and collections. Tripods and open flashbulbs are not allowed, but flashcubes and electronic units are acceptable. Exceptions: flash photography is not permitted in the drawings and manuscripts galleries, and no photography is permitted in the photographs gallery. Commercial photography of the Museum grounds or collections is not permitted, nor is the reproduction for publication of any visitor's photograph. Reproduction for publication must be made from photographic materials supplied or authorized by the Museum. Press and other inquiries should be made to the Public Information department at (213) 459-7611.

**Inspection of Bags, Parcels, and Carrying Cases.** Museum visitors are advised that the contents of all bags, parcels, and carrying cases are subject to security inspection. Permission to enter the Museum premises is granted subject to this regulation. This precaution is necessary for the proper safeguarding of the Museum and its collections. Your cooperation is appreciated.

### EDUCATIONAL SERVICES FOR VISITORS

The educational services listed below are available without charge. Information on specific program



topics, schedules, and locations may be obtained upon arrival at the Museum.

**Orientation.** Brief introductory talks that describe the Museum, its collections, and its gardens are given every fifteen minutes between 9:45 a.m. and 3:15 p.m. at the south end of the Main Peristyle Garden. A brief slide/tape program in the Orientation Theater to the left of the entrance vestibule describes the Museum and its collections.

**Background and Gallery Talks.** Talks are offered daily in the galleries, gardens, and Auditorium on a variety of subjects related to the Museum and its collections.

**Browsing Room, Information Center, and Videodiscs.** The Browsing Room contains books, audiovisual materials, and other information on the Museum and its collections. The Information Center contains changing exhibitions and demonstrations that encourage visitor participation. Both are located on the second floor.

An interactive videodisc on illuminated manuscripts is located in the Browsing Room; another on Greek vases is located in the Antiquities galleries.

**Lectures.** The Museum presents Thursday evening lectures to introduce the public to the work of scholars whose fields of research relate to the Museum's collections. For information and reservations, call (213) 458-2003.

**Calendar.** The Museum publishes a monthly calendar announcing exhibitions, classes, lectures, concerts, and news about the Museum and its collections. To receive the *Calendar*, send your name and address to the Museum's Public Information department and ask that your name be added to the *Calendar* mailing list.

#### GENERAL INFORMATION





The J. Paul Getty Museum is one of seven programs of the J. Paul Getty Trust, a private operating foundation devoted to the visual arts. The Museum houses permanent collections of Greek and Roman antiquities, pre-twentieth-century European paintings, drawings, sculpture, illuminated manuscripts, decorative arts, and nineteenth- and twentieth-century European and American photographs. The building itself is a recreation of a first-century-A.D. Roman country villa, with interior and exterior gardens.

**Location.** The Museum is located at 17985 Pacific Coast Highway in Malibu, between Sunset and Topanga Canyon boulevards. It is approximately twenty-five miles west of downtown Los Angeles. The temperature along the coast is usually about ten degrees cooler than in inland areas.

**Hours.** The Museum is open Tuesday through Sunday, 10:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., year-round. It is closed Mondays and on New Year's

Day, Independence Day, Thanksgiving Day, and Christmas Day.

**Admission and Parking Policy.** Admission to the Museum is free, but certain restrictions apply. Under the terms of an agreement with local homeowners, it is the Museum's responsibility to ensure that visitors do not park on surrounding streets. For this reason no walk-in visitors are permitted. Parking on Museum premises is extremely limited. If you wish to arrive by car, van, or truck, please call or write in advance for parking reservations.

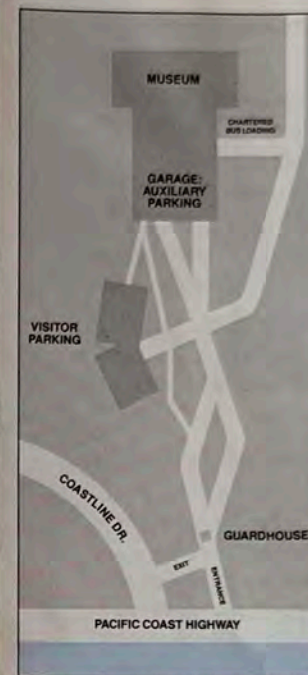
Since reservations fill quickly, it is advisable to call one week to ten days in advance of your visit. If the date you request is not available, our Reservations agent will suggest another. You can select from morning, midday, and afternoon arrival times and stay as long as you wish. (Two to three hours is the suggested time for seeing the Museum.)

For parking reservations and further information, call the Reservations Office at (213) 458-2003 between 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m., seven days a week.

#### OTHER MEANS OF VISITING THE MUSEUM

(without parking reservations)

**Taxicabs.** Taxicabs may drop off visitors at the entrance to the Museum building. However, only city-licensed cabs bearing the City of Los Angeles seal are allowed to pick up visitors on the premises. Direct phone lines to city-licensed cab companies are provided for your convenience in the lower-level lobby and garage.




**Private Automobile Drop-off.** You may be dropped off and picked up at the Museum. To do so, check in with the officer at the Front Gate Guardhouse before getting out of the car.

**RTD Bus with Pass.** RTD bus line 434, serving Santa Monica and Malibu, stops at the Pacific Coast Highway entrance to the Museum grounds (see map at left). Please call RTD at (800) 252-7433 for more information.

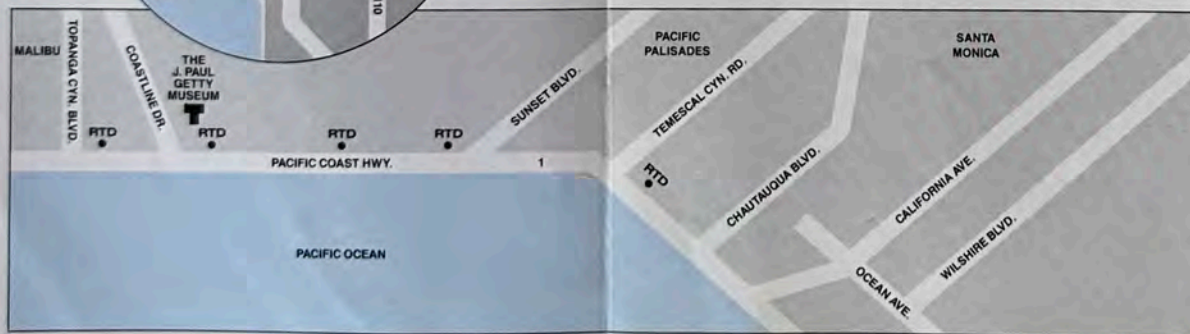
If you arrive by RTD bus, you must obtain a free admission pass from the driver and present it to the officer at the Front

Gate Guardhouse. Only bona fide RTD passengers will be admitted. Please note: The Museum is a half-mile walk from the bus stop. Sturdy walking shoes are recommended.

**Bicycles and Motorcycles.** Bicycle parking racks are available. Bicyclists should be aware that there is no designated bicycle path along Pacific Coast Highway. Motorcyclists will be directed to designated parking spaces.

 **Disabled Visitor Access.** Parking is available for visitors with official disabled identification; the officer at the Front Gate Guardhouse will assist you. Restrooms, water fountains, and telephones accommodating disabled visitors are on the lower level; an additional telephone is outside the restrooms on the main level.

A limited number of wheelchairs are available. Some seating areas of the Garden Tea Room are wheelchair accessible, but the cafeteria service area is not. See the plan on this side of the brochure for suggested wheelchair routes through the Museum and for the location of facilities





serving visitors with disabilities. All galleries are wheelchair accessible. The Reservations telephone is TDD-equipped for the hearing-impaired; call (213) 394-7448.

#### GROUP VISITS

**Chartered Buses.** Groups intending to visit the Museum by chartered bus must make reservations through the Reservations Office; call (213) 458-2003 between 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m., seven days a week.

Buses may not park at the Museum. Drivers will be directed to unload their passengers, leave the property, and return to pick up passengers at a prearranged time. Museum security staff will assist with these procedures.

A limited number of charter bus reservations are available for any given day, so it is advisable to call six to eight weeks in advance.

**School Groups, Group Tours, Lecture Policy.** For primary and secondary school groups, the Education and Academic Affairs department offers lessons and previsit materials at no charge.

Groups of up to twenty-five individuals affiliated with art or academic institutions may arrange special gallery talks or seminars six weeks in advance through the Education and Academic Affairs department.

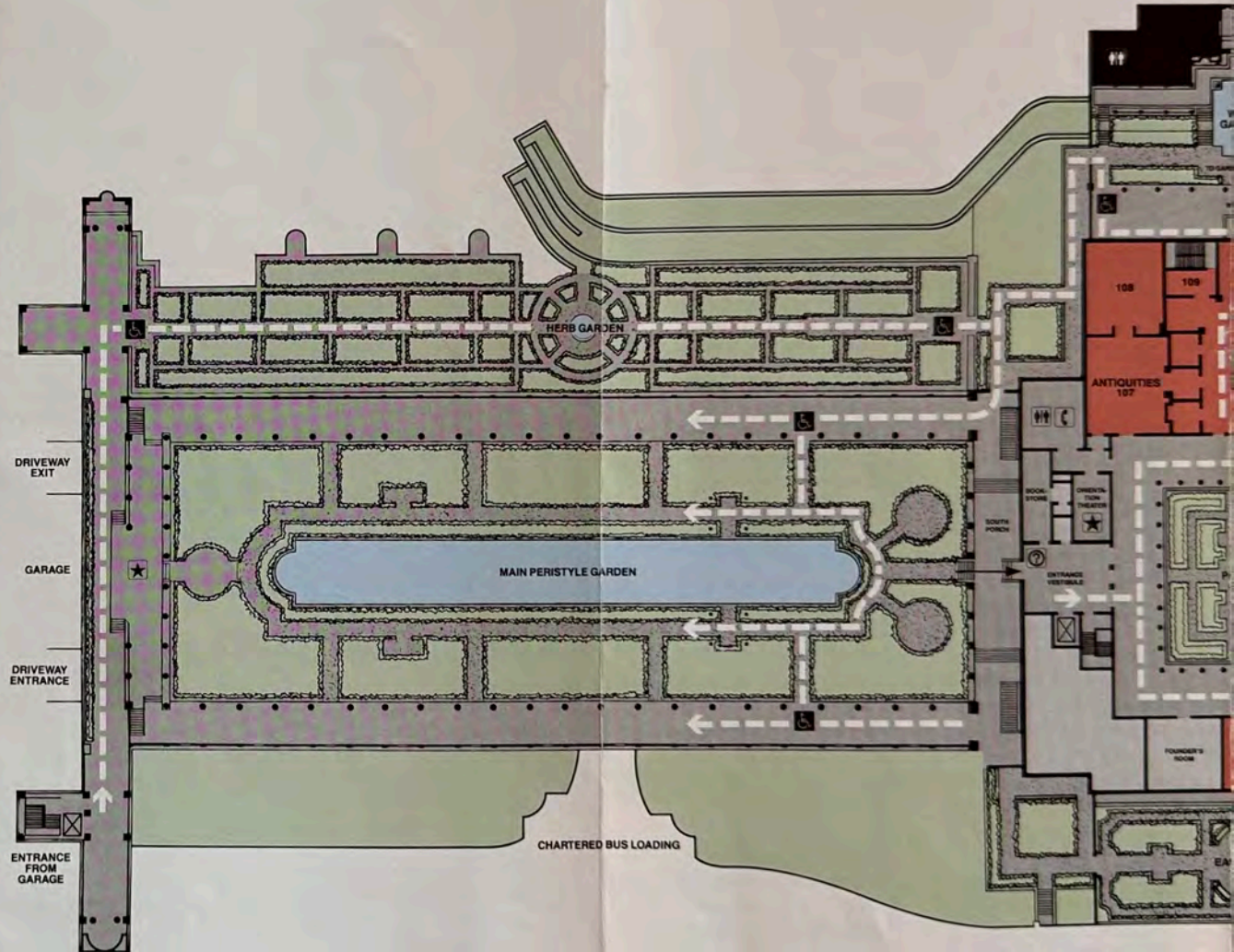
Unaffiliated groups are welcome to join the background and gallery talks offered to the public daily on selected areas of the Museum's collections.

Lecturing in the Museum's galleries or on the grounds is strictly limited to Museum staff members and instructors who are leading groups from accredited educational institutions. To make arrangements to conduct a course or course session at the Museum, contact the Reservations Office. No more than two buses or fifteen cars per group reservation are permitted. Parking passes are issued in advance.

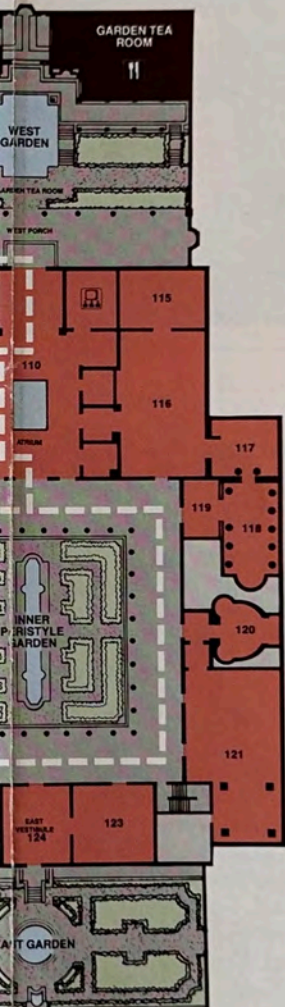

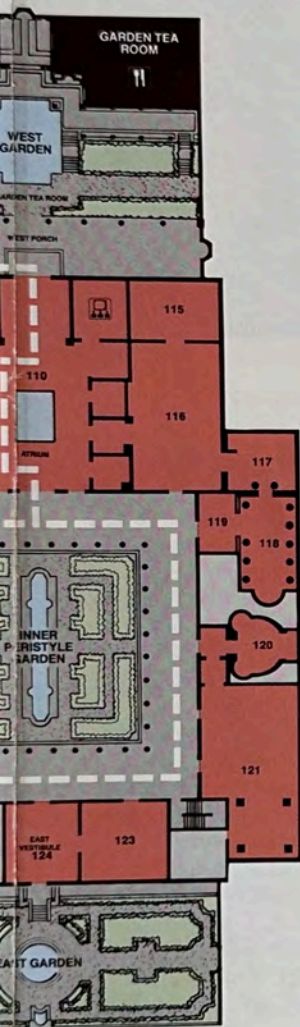
